

Since we are in the midst of the winter season, most of our property maintenance tasks are in hibernation. However, the board is actively reviewing the projects and plans for the upcoming year. As you are fully aware, it's been an especially long winter this year, and it feels good to be thinking about warmer weather, green grass, and working on our common areas and in our yards. This helps a little in getting us through these seasonal doldrums.

We are reviewing our future landscape lighting and irrigation system needs. Our focus is on the major entrance walls leading into Oakhurst – such as Oakhurst Drive and Eola Road, Cheshire Drive and McCoy and Asbury Drive and New York Street. Many of the components of both systems are about 20 years old, so there is a real



need for repairing and upgrading the systems and replacing the many broken and outdated fixtures. We are exploring the use of new technologies to create more efficiencies and a longer lifespan such as incorporating LED lighting solutions into our landscape lighting systems.

As an additional winter task, the Oakhurst Landscape Committee is gearing up for the new planting and growing seasons by working with our landscape company, Countrywide, to finalize decisions on our planting and maintenance requirements for 2011. Weather permitting, and depending on when the snow finally disappears, we hope to start the actual work in early March, as appropriate.

Our continuing mission is to direct your investments in our community to the best uses and to keep the appearance of Oakhurst as fresh and crisp as possible.

We hope 2011 is shaping into a great year for you.

Communication

The end of 2010 brought some changes to the communications options we enjoy here in the 8th Ward of Aurora. The final edition of the Fox Valley Sun, our weekly newspaper devoted to our specific portion of Aurora, hit our driveways just before the Christmas holiday. Over the years, this paper has had many names including '60504' but it was intended to be an extension of the Beacon News, the daily paper based in Aurora. In recent months, some residents began seeing the paper in a much different light in some neighborhoods, that of unwanted waste. This did not cause the demise of the paper, but other systemic changes to how we communicate did.

With the rise of the Internet age came a new way to deliver news and information, some powerful, some damaging, some useful and some very bogus information. It's doubtful we have seen the end of this evolution. Large metropolitan daily newspapers in cities across America have reconfigured how they deliver the news, in some cases printing only 3 or 4 times a week leaving the remaining days covered by online versions. Locally, the Beacon News will have gone to a 6 day a week publication schedule, eliminating the Saturday edition, as this is printed. This step comes after it moved from a 'broadsheet', full size newspaper to the

smaller tabloid style a few years ago. As a part of the Sun-Times Media organization, they also have a fairly fully featured online version at www.SuburbanChicagoNews.com and cover local news and events. There is also the Daily Herald with their Aurora/Naperville edition with some limited coverage of the area news along with the Chicago Tribune, TribLocal, and the Sun-Times. The one constant we can expect over the next few years is the continuing evolution of the traditional printed media outlets and the addition of more of the newer Internet based, mobile based and wireless solutions to deliver information to you.

I have long been a proponent of new technology, use it every day and continue to relish the next best technology that will add value to our lives. I will admit I was sorry to see the Fox Valley Sun go. In my position, I realize not everybody embraces technology but, at least once each week, all of our residents had an opportunity to get news and information about their city. Since not many subscribe to the Beacon News in our part of Aurora and some have never used the Internet for their news, this small weekly newspaper filled a need here for many years as we grew. This was information many found important and I suspect we will miss. I will also miss Judy Buchenot's 'Fox Tales' column, something she wrote for some 20 years bringing us an insightful look into the people and events of our local area and how they fit into our lives. It

was part of the fabric we were weaving, our identity in this part of town.

A year ago, we added our own 8th Ward website, www.MyWard8.com to provide another outlet for very local information. As part of that website, I gave you the option to sign up for email alerts and the newsletter, yet another way to communicate. This Oakhurst Oracle has been a big addition here in Oakhurst for the last six years or so and allows both Alderman Elmore and me to get information you ask about to you on a monthly basis. The new Editor of the Oracle is looking for other ways to keep us connected here in Oakhurst as the New Year breaks. In addition, the City of Aurora website at www.Aurora-il.org is another source of information as well. Most of you know about the Aurora Customer Service Center (on McCoy at Fire Station 8), open Monday through Friday from 8 AM until 5 PM to walk in or call (630) 256-INFO (4636) or online 24/7 through the city website.

I've heard from some of you about the loss of the Fox Valley Sun. The loss of any means of communication is painful but in this case, shouldn't be your last or only option. You have many more to avail yourself should you choose. You won't have much choice but to find new options over the next few years as the printed media in our Chicago metropolitan area try to find their place in our new technological lives.

Board of Directors TOWNES OF OAKHURST

This begins my ninth year of writing a monthly column for ORACLE. That is 96 articles on a variety of topics and issues. I thought I might run out of things to write about, but that hasn't been the case. There is always something new that catches my eye or piques my interest. So I will plan to make it to my tenth year and see what happens after that.

It will be 13 years in June since I moved into my home at the Townes of Oakhurst. This was a very good decision to leave my previous home of 18 years and move here. Why? Because this townhome community is located near to everything, because there is a marsh just across the street and a park and because homes are spacious and comfortable. We are, in many ways, living in Paradise. Not quite close enough to an ocean or the mountains, but close to most everything else. There is the Mall which is one mile east. There is the library which is one mile south. There are schools. There is Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church, also within walking distance at one mile. There are groceries stores and drug stores and cleaners and hairdressers and the post office and, shall we mention, Starbucks? There is Phillips Park and the Naperville Riverwalk and cinemas and medical offices close by. I can't think of any need that can't be met within walking distance or a short car ride when living in Oakhurst.

What has changed and what comments can I make about living here? When I moved here, the community was mostly older, retired people who didn't have dogs. So it was more quiet, the lawns looked better and generally, it was a much quieter place. I still have yet to understand why anyone would use a front lawn as their dog's toilet. What about walking across the street to the marsh area and do the deed there? The barking has really gotten out of hand. Within hearing from my living room or my patio, there are now twenty dogs that seem, at least

to me, to bark more than is necessary. They bark at anyone passing. They are left unattended on patios and lawns to bark without any caregiver in sight. This is just unacceptable. Aurora has noise ordinances and such chronic barking can be cause for a neighbor to phone the police who will or might issue a \$250 ticket for such constant neighborhood noise. Please take care of your dogs in a responsible manner. Yes, I am fully aware that dogs do bark but well-behaved dogs do not bark incessantly.

Another matter that comes before the Board these past 12 years has been parking issues. Your neighbors do not want to be blocked in their own driveways because you have too many cars for your one-car garage. Neither do we want to see parking overnight on any Oakhurst street. There is a city of Aurora ordinance that prohibits overnight parking here. Please inform any guests of this rule. Again, the police will be called and a ticket can be issued.

I also am curious why people want Cadillac service on a Ford budget. If we approved every single request that



comes before the Board, your monthly assessments would go through the roof. There are expenses that are necessary, like lawn mowing and snow removal, and then there are expenses that are mostly cosmetic, like mulching or tree trimming. The City does not do either and it seems to me that things look pretty good in many neighborhoods without such unnecessary expenses. Other townhome communities do not provide many of the services that have been offered here. Homeowners have to install their own bushes and trees, for

example. If they want driveway/sidewalk snow removed, they have to pay extra for that service. Homeowners elsewhere are asked to shovel their own property or pay extra. So realize just how good you have it living here and support your board members as they make the difficult but necessary decisions for the good of this community.

MC Property Management has provided excellent service these past 12 years. Michelle Cohen, property manager, knows vendors who give us the best prices for their services, knows whom to call and when an emergency exists, knows just about everything to ensure that the Townes remain a beautiful place to live where property values increase and where the landscape looks desirable for any new homeowner. Hats off to them!

Really, when you think about it, our issues are not life-threatening and won't break the bank. We are a 136-townhome community of all ages and occupations and hopes and dreams and education and temperament. I think the one idea I would like you to take away from this column is simply this: Be considerate of your neighbors when you live in such close proximity. Be mindful that your noisy party at 2:00 a.m. is unacceptable in any neighborhood. Your pounding rock music is not appreciated by the neighbors with whom you share common walls. Be thoughtful. The Board hears many complaints, but I can count on one hand the number of times a homeowner gave us a compliment in the past decade. And I don't recall ever a handwritten note of thanks. Yet your lawns and trees and driveways and roofs and chimneys and general upkeep has been superb. How about a New Year's Resolution to contribute to this neighborhood by simply being considerate?

Customer Service Call Center Hours Changing

The city of Aurora's Customer Service Call Center service hours will change to 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The city modified the call center's hours due to budgetary constraints and to maintain adequate staffing levels for residents who call 630-256-INFO or stop by the facility at 3770 McCoy Drive. The city determined a majority of calls and walk-in customers take place during the city's normal business hours.

Residents can expect prompt and efficient customer service when calling the city of Aurora. The Customer Service Call Center is designed to be one-stop shopping for nearly every call or question regarding the city other than emergencies, which should be directed to 911. The call center handles nearly 60,000 calls annually. If customers call after hours, they will be directed via voicemail where to report urgent problems, such as sewer backups. Messages left on the voicemail will be addressed the next business day.

Residents also can submit an issue electronically to customer service 24-hours a day, seven days a week by visiting the city's Website at www.aurora-il.org.

Story That's So Divine

Soup warms the soul, and in these cold months, it is also giving some folks pride when they are down on their luck. "Pride – and marketable job skills," says Ryan Dowd, executive director at Hesed House in Aurora. Soup has been a big boost to the second-largest homeless shelter in Illinois, Dowd said. Two years ago, he was intrigued with the idea of running an established soup business out of Hesed House. Today, Dowd is grateful for the opportunity and the good things it has done for the shelter. Most of all, he is thankful to two people for bringing soup to his attention.

Tom Burgess of Geneva has long supported the mission of Hesed House and the work they do. Burgess and his wife, Lindsey, fell in love with soup several years ago after Lindsey picked up some packages of Harvest House homemade soup mix from a local arts and craft show. Harvest House homemade soup mix was owned by Laurel Gabrielson who started selling dried soup mixes as a single mom in the mid-1990s to help her "smooth out the edges." A job change and a wish to find a place to volunteer came at the same time that Tom Burgess called and made an offer to buy the soup business in order to donate to Hesed House as well as offer to keep her involved as time allowed.

After the purchase, Burgess renamed it Soups Divine and residents at Hesed House now package, label and sell at various craft shows during the fall and winter. All proceeds go to Hesed House bringing in much needed revenue at a time when donations and grants are uncertain. In addition to the revenue, Soups Divine provides homeless individuals with marketable job skills. "We all had the same needs. Something bigger than us put us all together," said Gabrielson of her relationship with Burgess and Dowd. "For (Burgess) to take this and make it what it is – a project that totally benefits Hesed House – I feel privileged.

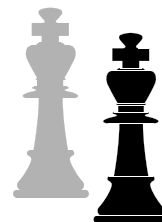

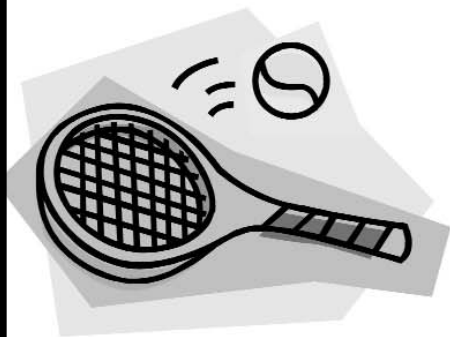

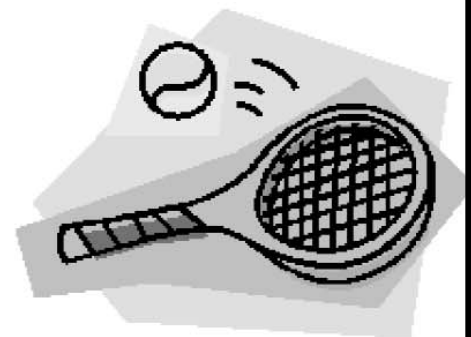
