

Our Ash Trees Are in Danger

For many of you, this is not news although the loss of this many trees so fast has had an impact. While the problem had been discussed in this forum in the past along with the local newspapers, TV News and the City's newsletter, Web site and the 8th Ward Web site, let me bring you up to date. The Emerald Ash Borer, an invasive species, has been identified since 2006 as a threat to every ash tree. First sighted in Aurora in 2009, this voracious pest has been infesting our ash trees at an exponential rate – and we have hundreds of thousands of ash trees in Aurora!

The City of Aurora is designated a "Tree City" and as such, has an arborist on staff along with trained tree crews. The crews are working non-stop since the Spring leaf-out to eliminate the infested trees and slow or reduce the spread. In addition, the City has a Tree Board made up of tree specialists, a horticulturist consultant, residents and our arborist. This board has been working to tackle this problem alongside the Morton Arboretum to help identify potential solutions. The Arboretum has been inoculating some ash trees in Aurora for the last few years to help determine what solutions work and what doesn't. This year, they are taking down many of those trees that have since died and will do a post mortem to see if they can learn anything that can lead to a way to get rid of these pests. While I know the tree companies are claiming they can treat your trees, the arborists are telling me that unless the tree is very young, if infested, it will eventually die. The younger the tree, the better chance that a drench or other solution may work. Unfortunately, there shouldn't be many young ash trees out there that were planted after 2006.

Let me clarify one rumor: The City is NOT clear cutting all ash trees. We are hopeful of a solution. This is one of the reasons we are working with the Morton Arboretum. We will only cut down infested and dead trees. The City tree crews have been attempting to get rid of the trees on City property, in the parkways and park lands once they are infested. The remaining wood needs to be destroyed and cannot be kept for firewood. Trees on private property are the property owner's responsibility. While the City of Aurora tree crews will help you with an evaluation as time permits,

you will have to engage a private firm properly trained and registered to remove and dispose of the tree as soon as possible on private property. If you suspect an infested tree, call 630-256-4636 to report the location. You can identify the infested trees as follows: 1) top of tree is dead 2) splits in the bark 3) small D-shaped holes, many with little green bugs inside 4) much of the tree is dead and the tree is sending out small branches from the base of the tree. The City will eventually grind out the remaining stump and schedule most of them for replanting in the Fall. Call me with any additional questions.

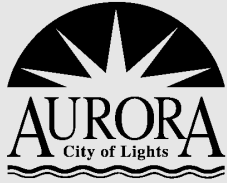

Board of Directors TOWNES OF OAKHURST

The Mayflower beached at Cape Cod, Massachusetts in the year 1620. Wm. Bradford wrote "Being thus passed the vast ocean, and a sea of troubles...they now had no friends to welcome them, nor inns to entertain them or refresh their weather beaten bodies." Those pilgrims deserve to be remembered for two things: survival and the Mayflower Compact. That proclamation was a bold assertion of their right to govern themselves. By 1733 three main cultures emerged from the English settlements. The Southern planter society had a fluid aristocracy open to labor and talent. The egalitarian settlements of New England. And the varied middle colonies, reaching from New York to the Virginia border. Those were at once agrarian and mercantile, giving birth to the first cities, a string of ports and diverse tradesmen from printer-publisher to skilled workman.

"When in the course of human events..." begins the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776. The document listed about two dozen "abuses and usurpations" from King George III. Such egregious actions as depriving citizens of trial by jury or taxing without consent of the people. "He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coast, burnt our towns and destroyed the lives of our people." The colonists methodically built a case for separation from the crown. They submitted the facts "to a candid world." They declared their resolve and their independence with these words "And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence, we mutually pledge

to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor." Thomas Jefferson was the principal author.

The Second Continental Congress approved a resolution of independence from Great Britain on July 2, 1776. Two days later, after modifications Jefferson called "degradations," the Congress approved the Declaration. Most members of Congress signed the document on August 2, 1776. The 56 men who risked everything, their fortunes and their very lives, believed that all people are created to be free. John Adams predicted in a July 3 letter to his wife, Abigail, that July 2 would be "celebrated by succeeding generations...with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more."

The signers were labeled traitors and charged with treason a crime punishable by death. For some their acts of rebellion would cost them their homes and their fortunes. For others, their very lives. They had spoken out against the most powerful empire in the world. Thomas Jefferson and John Adams would become American presidents. Lewis Morris lost his whole estate. The British ravaged and destroyed it. Carter Braxton's entire career and way of life was decimated. He lost his ships to the British Navy and his shipping company was forever lost. Thomas Nelson's price for liberty was \$2 million. That was his credit debt for the "Patriots' Cause." He died bankrupt and was buried in an unmarked grave. Richard Stockton, a prominent judge, was taken from his bed and tortured by British soldiers.

These heroic patriots risked it all to preserve the freedoms we now possess.

The Bill of Rights contain 462 words that guarantee our American freedoms. Read it today. Remember it. Make sure you stand up for those principles and for "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

This July 4th as you barbeque the chickens and steaks, as you fly the American flag and celebrate with your family and friends these precious freedoms, remember the brave ones who have given us those words to protect a way of life that few others on the planet can enjoy. American, which ends with the words "I can" is still the best country in the world. Our citizenry is an industrious and enterprising melting pot of nationalities who hold hands and sing "America the Beautiful" together. Whether your family has emigrated from Italy or Sweden, Sri Lanka or South Vietnam, we are all Americans living and working and praying and achieving each our own version of the American dream. For some that means the open spaces of Montana ranching. For others it means the great streets and commotion of New York City. For others it means a southern existence, slow and mellow. Whether you are a city mouse or a country mouse, this country can offer opportunities to each of us regardless how diverse our own talents and ambitions. I have a round button that reads "The only disability is a bad attitude." In this month of celebrating the red, white and blue, be sure that you look to the light, to the positive, to the grand design of your best possible future. Because in America you can make it happen. Whatever those dreams may be.

In the past, I have written about the fact that reported crimes are at unprecedented lows. That is not to say that there is not any crime! In looking at those offenses that are reported, many of them are property crimes of opportunity. One of the ones leading the charge is bicycle theft. And almost all of these are preventable! You have heard it before...

Have your children put their bicycles in the garage and close your garage when you are not present!

Kids are out enjoying their summer break and riding their bicycles to visit with friends. Unfortunately, leaving their brand new bicycle in the front yard is an invitation for a would be thief. Educate your children not to leave their bicycle in plain view. If your house is the one where children congregate for the day, invite them to put their bicycles in the backyard or a closed garage.

Unfortunately, all too often when a citizen reports a stolen bicycle they cannot provide a serial number. Without a serial number it is almost impossible to reunite you with your stolen property. We recover close to 200 bicycles yearly. Most of them are sent off to auction because their serial

number is not listed as being reported stolen. Even worse, there are times when officers are out with a subject that they believe has a stolen bicycle and if the serial number is not reported as stolen the officer has little to no recourse.

With school out, many families find the opportunity to take a much needed vacation. If you are planning that family vacation, remember the basics of crime prevention:

- Have a few interior lights on timers
- Utilize exterior lighting and/or motion lights
- Have a neighbor collect your mail and any newspapers
- Have a neighbor periodically ensure everything is secure
- Store your valuable belongings in a safe or secret location

Whether you are staying home for your summer vacation or traveling abroad, do your part to ensure the your belongings are secure.

Latest Warning

Do not use Cocoa mulch in landscaping beds. It is highly toxic to pets. Please warn your neighbors and friends: it is attractive, inexpensive, and very dangerous.

Top 10 Human Medications Toxic to Pets

- NSAIDS- aspirin, ibuprofen.
- Acetaminophen-Tylenol ®.
- Antidepressants(Cymbalta®, Prozac®, Lexapro®, Effexor®.)
- ADD and ADHD drugs- i.e. Ritalin®
- Benzodiazepines(Xanax®, Klonopin®, Ambien®.)
- Birth control medications
- ACE inhibitors

- Beta Blockers
- Lipitor® - very mild

Not on the top ten for incidence of poisoning, but dangerous to your pets are Advair® inhalers and Abilify®.

Top 11 People Foods Dangerous to Pets

The top eleven "people foods" the ASPCA Poison Control Center considers dangerous to pets:

- Chocolate, Coffee, Caffeine
- Alcohol
- Milk-perhaps due to lactose intolerance in some pets
- Salt - Never use salt to induce vomiting in pets, once advised by old timers.
- Avocado
- Macadamia Nuts
- Yeast Dough
- Raw/Undercooked Meat, Eggs and Bones (I would include raw diets sold for pet consumption, and be very careful if you produce your own raw pet diet.)
- Xylitol- artificial sweetener Check labels for mints and gum!
- Onions, Garlic, Chives.
